AB 32	Enacts the feel-good Global Warming Act of 2006, creating vague statewide carbon dioxide emission limits with the goal of reducing emissions by 25% by 2020.	Nunez	Signed into law
AB 675	Requires corporations to explain complex differences between their corporate financial statements and their income tax statements (even though government itself is responsible for all of those complicated differences).	Klehs	Vetoed
AB 1369	This is a representative "MOU bill" in which the Legislature ratified a union contract providing for irresponsible salary and benefit increases for state workers, as well as mandatory collection of union dues ("fair share fees") from paychecks.	Nunez	Signed into law
AB 2067	"Nanny State" bill banning smoking in common areas of public buildings, including covered parking structures.	Oropeza	Signed into law
AB 2360	Makes it a crime to sell or lease ultrasound machines to anyone without a license (such as crisis pregnancy centers).	Liu	Vetoed
AB 2496	Would have limited toilets to 1.3 gallons/flush.	Laird	Vetoed
AB 2911	Requires drug makers to provide discounts for uninsured Californians or risk sanctions in three years.	Nunuez	Signed into law
SB 59	Punishes crime victims by making it a crime to fail to report a lost or stolen handgun within 5 days. Repeals provisions in current law designed to prevent a patchwork of local rules.	Lowenthal	Vetoed
SB 160	Would have required California colleges and universities to offer financial aid to illegal aliens who are already enrolled there as in-state students.	Cedillo	Vetoed
SB 927	Imposes an unconstitutional new tax on shipping containers to fund rail system improvements, pollution mitigation measures, and port security enhancements.	Lowenthal	Vetoed
SB 1578	Makes it illegal to tether a dog to a stationary object for more than three hours (with a penalty of up to six months in jail).	Lowenthal	Signed into law
SB 1613	Bans cell phone use in cars, unless the driver uses a hands-free device (which are, coincidentally, sold by the sponsors).	Simitian	Signed into law
SB 1266	Proposition 1B -- the "Empty Public Transit Bond." This is the largest bond in world history at \$19.925 billion, with only dedicated to 32% highways and roads (including environmental reports and mitigation as "roads").	Perata	Signed, then Approved by Voters
SB 1689	Proposition 1C - the \$2.85 billion "Illegal Alien Housing Bond," which will do nothing to reduce housing costs. Substantial funding is reserved for local parks and other projects that should be funded at the local level by those who benefit.	Perata	Signed, then Approved by Voters
AB 127	Proposition 1D -- the \$10.416 billion "School Bond," approved despite current funding of \$11,400 per student per school year! This is a "Blue County Bond" because local districts need to raise taxes for matching funds to receive anything.	Nunez	Signed, then Approved by Voters
AB 140	Proposition 1E -- the "Flood Bond," a \$4.09 billion bond that may do nothing to reduce flood risks because it provides funding for only a few dozen miles of levees out of 2,500 miles of public levees. No cost to those who benefit financially.	Nunez	Signed, then Approved by Voters
AB 1801	Budget Act of 2006, which irresponsibly increased spending by over 12% despite the huge deficit.	Laird	Signed into law
